Welcome Back and Happy New Year! We hope that all of you had an enjoyable winter break. This week's cold snap reminds us that there is still a lot of winter to come. Remember to set your HCPSS News information and preferences for notifications to be sure that you are the first to hear about school closings and delays. (TV/Radio notifications are not a reliable source for this information.)

It is hard to believe that the year is nearly half complete! The second quarter/first semester ends on January 22, 2016 and report cards will be issued on February 1, 2016. Parent/Teacher Conferences will be held the afternoon and evening of February 4, 2016 and during the day on February 5, 2016. Look for information coming soon regarding the window for signing up for conferences.

Unfortunately, we need to bring a very serious topic to your attention. This Monday, we learned that many Wilde Lake Students were involved in the inappropriate use of social media while away from school on break. A large number of students were recognized accessing an "Instagram" site where students were using profane language, making disparaging remarks about a staff member and school peer, and students were also making threats to harm a WLMS Student. These remarks triggered unsafe feelings and a disruption to our school learning environment. With the assistance of HCPSS Resources, administration was able to identify students who participated in making the comments and those who accessed the site. Due to the impact on our school environment, students who participated received consequences commensurate with their involvement. According to the HCPSS Code of Conduct, Cyberbullying and School Disruption (including behavior that originates off campus with technology) can result in a range of consequences from a student conference to parent conduct to suspension from school, and expulsion from school.

We share this information with you in order to appeal to all parents to be vigilante in monitoring your child's use of social media. Just because your child does not have his/her own cell phone does not mean that they are not accessing chat sites through their friends' phones or computers. In addition, we have learned that students will use aliases or proxy web browsers to access restricted sites. Please make it your job to educate yourselves as parents on the different sites on which your child might already have an account (Kik, Snapchat, Instagram, etc.). Read the "Terms of Use". Most sites require students to be at least 13 years old to use the service. Take the time to read the comments and language being used by other teenagers on the site. Make time this weekend to have a conversation with your child about your expectations for technology use and take the necessary actions.

We are committed to making Wilde Lake Middle School a safe and productive learning environment. Therefore, the administration has no tolerance for cyber-bullying and any derogatory comments made towards our staff or our students. The HCPSS Code of Conduct will continue to be enforced to protect all students and our learning environment. Parents, your monitoring at home will make the difference in partnering with us to create both a positive school and community environment for our students.

Policy 8030: Graduation Requirement - Update for Families

In the spring of 2015, the Howard County Public School System Board of Education voted to accept revision to <u>Policy 8030 – Graduation Requirements</u>. In the revised policy, students who successfully complete high school level courses while in middle school will earn high school credit. Previously, students would receive credit for completing the course, but the credit would not count toward the 21 credits required for high school graduation.

The specific excerpt from the policy is shown below:

A. Credit for High School Courses Taken in Middle School

High school courses, which are offered at the middle school level, are eligible for high school credit.

Beginning with courses completed in the 2015-2016 school year:

- 1. The student's passed course will count toward the 21 credits for graduation requirement.
- 2. The student's course grade will be recorded on the high school transcript.
- 3. The student's grade will not be calculated into the high school grade point average. If a student re-takes one of the high-school courses taken in middle school for which credit was earned:
 - a. The high school grade will be calculated into the GPA, and
 - b. Only one credit will be awarded.
- 4. For high school world language courses, one credit will be awarded at the completion of a course in grade 8.
